

### SUMMARY OF WORKSHOPS AND KEYNOTE ADDRESS

Workshop I 9:00—10:00 a.m.

### A Janice Thompson: Playwriting 101

Write the play of your dreams using this simple plotting method. Add zing, zip, and pizazz to your characters, your plotline, and your setting. Give your audience members the time of their lives.

### B Jennifer Slattery: Creating Page-Turning Fiction

In this workshop, Jennifer Slattery discusses the components to great, satisfying, and page-turning fiction. These include high stakes, a sense of urgency, sensitivity to the emotions of the reader (balancing emotive sections with comic relief), a strong and consistent moral premise (not to be confused with spiritual theme), and consistent and believable plots and subplots that work together.

### C Eva Marie Everson: A Look at Your Novel, Scene by Scene

A key to writing successful novels is taking the time to break them down scene by scene. What questions should a novelist ask of the work? The plot? The characters? Or themselves? Be prepared by bringing in a scene of your own work in progress for this hands-on workshop.

Workshop II 10:15—11:15 a.m.

### A Melanie Stiles: Self-Publishing 101

Should you self-publish? After this workshop with Melanie Stiles, you will be able to answer the question. Melanie will discuss the pros and cons of self-publishing. She will also address a variety of tools to help you through the process. You will receive a checklist that outlines each step necessary to begin your self-publishing journey.

### B Sherri Stewart: So, You've Finished Writing Your Book. Now What?

Once the writer has written "The End" on the last page of the book, the work now begins to prepare the rough draft for the editor. Notice that did not say publisher. This hands-on workshop led by Sherri Stewart will focus on fiction conventions such as point of view and show versus tell. Sherri will also discuss choosing a beta reader team.

### C Eva Marie Everson: Understanding Deep Point of View

Understanding deep point of view (POV) begins with understanding the five (or is it six?) senses. In this favorite workshop, Eva Marie Everson uses hands-on methods to teach conferees to 1) understand deep POV, 2) bring the senses into their work in order to draw readers into the story, and 3) how a simple sentence can become a powerful scene. Bring a pad and pen or your laptop for this hands-on workshop.

### Jennifer Slattery: Living Out Your Call

Throughout Scripture we see this truth: the greater the call, the longer the journey, and the more intense the training. Setbacks are not dead ends; they are training. ### B Sherri Stewart: Ten Things That Will Make Your Editor Very Happy

Remember how it felt to get your report card in the mail? That is what having your book edited feels like. You, the author, can put a smile on your editor's face simply by correcting ten common mistakes ahead of time. In addition to revealing these mistakes and how to correct them, Sherri Stewart will discuss different types of editing in this hands-on workshop.

### C Martha Rogers: Using the Five Senses to Enhance Your Writing

The senses of sight, sound, smell, taste, and touch are what make our stories come alive and put the reader into the story. This workshop will cover how to use the senses to give your reader a true feeling of what is happening with your characters. Whether writing mystery and suspense or romance, use your senses to flesh out and enrich your stories.

### A Janice Thompson: C.O.N.F.L.I.C.T.

Up the tension, up the conflict, up the sales! Readers love it when you keep them turning the pages. In this practical class, you will learn how to add conflict in a way that is guaranteed to keep your readers hanging on.

### B Jennifer Slattery: Creating Characters That Grab Your Reader

Some characters entertain us; others take hold and do not let go. A well-crafted character grabs the reader at their deepest heart level, causing them to see themselves in the character's struggles and victories. In this workshop, Jennifer Slattery discusses abstract and concrete goals, inner lies, black moments, and character arcs. Writers will learn how to take their readers from merely enjoying their stories to living them.

### C Eva Marie Everson: Those All Important First Pages

Why are first pages so important? What is story and how does it differ from plot? What is voice ... tone ... theme? These questions and others will be explored and answered in this one-hour workshop given by bestselling, multiple award-winning author Eva Marie Everson. Everson looks at what agents, editors, and potential readers see right off the bat and why these must be among the best pages you, the author, write.
